Kentucky youth vaping leads to smoking: What you need to know

Over the last 75 years, smoking among adults and youths has been steadily decreasing. In the 2010s, rates of smoking reached all-time lows in the U.S. and Kentucky. Unfortunately, with the advent of vaping, this trend has quickly reversed.

This reversal is especially concerning given that young people who use e-cigarettes are more likely to smoke cigarettes in adulthood.

What are Vapes?

Electronic cigarettes, or vapes (short for vaporizers), typically contain nicotine. However, they sometimes contain other substances such as THC, the chemical in marijuana that gets people high.

Although emerging research seems to suggest that vaping is less harmful than smoking combustible cigarettes, vapes are nonetheless very harmful. They are especially harmful for young, developing brains.

In fact, most adult smokers began smoking before the age of 18.

Youth vaping rates are significantly increasing

Kentucky youth are vaping at a startling rate. The [Kentucky Incentives for Prevention survey](#) shows that vaping among 10th graders has increased almost 6% in five years – from 11.4% in 2016 to 17% in 2021.

In that same year, more than 20% of Kentucky high school students, and nearly 10% of Kentucky 8th graders, reported vaping in the past month.

In response, the state has launched a confidential quit line for youths called My Life, My Quit at ky.mylifemyquit.org/, which offers free coaching 24/7 via text, chat or call.

Vaping facts (accordingly to ky.mylifemyquit.org):

- **Nicotine leaves you stressed out.** Vaping to handle stress can make you more stressed! When you stop using nicotine, that “feel-good” dopamine stops flowing leaving you moody. The more nicotine you put into your brain, the more hooked you become.
- **Nicotine causes other problems.** Using nicotine as a teen makes your brain think it needs it, causing problems with learning, memory, paying attention and managing your mood. Additionally, it can also make you more likely to get hooked on other drugs.

Vape and tobacco companies want you to get hooked on nicotine. By keeping you craving more, companies will keep you as customers for life. Teens who start vaping are four times more likely to smoke cigarettes or use other forms of tobacco. Almost 90% of adults who use nicotine today started as teens.

We believe that quitting alone is hard; however, quitting with support is much easier.

Blackberry Lemon Upside Down Cake

2 teaspoons melted butter	1¼ cup all-purpose flour	1 large egg
½ cup brown sugar	1½ teaspoons baking powder	¾ teaspoon vanilla extract
1½ teaspoons grated lemon peel	¼ teaspoon salt	1 teaspoon lemon juice
2 cups fresh blackberries	¾ cup sugar	½ cup skim milk
	2 tablespoons butter	

Preheat oven to 350°F.

Place melted butter in the bottom of a 9-inch round cake pan.

Sprinkle with brown sugar and lemon rind.

Top with berries. Set aside.

Combine flour, baking powder and salt in a small bowl. Set dry ingredients aside.

Beat sugar and butter together in a large bowl with a mixer

on medium speed until well blended.

Add egg, vanilla, and lemon juice. Mix well.

Add dry ingredients to egg mixture alternately with milk, beginning with milk and ending with flour. Mix after each addition.

Spoon the batter over the blackberries.

Bake at 350 degrees for 40

minutes.

Cool cake for 5 minutes on a wire rack. Loosen edges of the cake with a knife and place a plate upside down on top of cake; invert onto plate.

Serve warm.

Yield: 8, 3 inch wedges.

September 25, 2024: No You Didn't by S.B. Pearce

October 9, 2024: Drama Under the Skin by Juana Moriel Payne

Utilizing local analysis to make global conclusions, Drama Under the Skin uses ritual as a lens to examine race and identity formation of both free and enslaved people of African descent and Indigenous groups in northern New Spain. Juana Moriel-Payne proposes that Baroque-Catholic ideology, as social culture, incited and promoted the participation of those peoples in religious rituals.

November 12, 2024: Forever Belle: Sallie Ward of Kentucky by Randolph Paul Runyon

Forever Belle is the intriguing story of a nineteenth-century socialite, Sallie Ward Lawrence Hunt Armstrong Downs (1827–1896). Beautiful, charming, and kind—but also reckless and bold—she was born in Scott County, Kentucky, to a family of means beset by tragedy—early deaths, suicides, and even murders. Sallie basked in the national spotlight, appearing in newspapers as far-flung as Milwaukee and Charleston, written up for her exploits, which included such scandalous behavior as smoking cigars, dressing in “Turkish pantalets,” wearing rouge, and getting divorced.

Fall is the Perfect Time for Annual Vaccines

Fall, specifically the months of September and October, is the most ideal time of the year to receive annual vaccines, including the flu and Covid vaccinations. This is because these vaccines get annual updates, and the updated vaccines are released in the late summer to early fall. The vaccines are modified slightly from year to year to provide the best protection to those receiving it for the upcoming year against the most common strains of those viruses.

Many contagious diseases become more common as the seasons change from fall to winter, because of changes in weather patterns, people spending more time indoors with poor ventilation, and holiday gatherings where people are in close proximity. Vaccines do take some time to reach peak effectiveness, so you want to receive your vaccines several weeks before planning to travel or attend large gatherings, to be most protected against severe effects of disease.

While you are receiving your annual flu and Covid vaccines, ask your health-care provider if there are other preventative vaccines that may benefit you based on your age or lifestyle, such as the shingles or pneumococcal vaccines.

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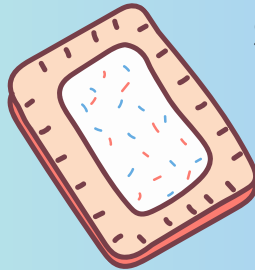
